

1. Purpose and the objectives of M&E

Monitoring and evaluation (M&E) is a process that can be defined as collecting, analyzing and making use of "relevant, accurate, timely, and affordable" data from various sources to provide information with the aim of program planning, program improvement and project management. This evidence-based approach allows for efficient and effective decision making; and is an integral part of a project cycle. Although inextricably complementary to each other, monitoring and evaluation activities differ in design and purpose.

Monitoring

- Regular data collection throughout the project period
- The purpose is to ensure the implementation is in line with the desired quality and the progress is ongoing according to the plan
- Involves activities of raising new strategies that need to be taken to achieve progress
- Varies according to specific informational needs and purpose
- Examples of monitoring types; result monitoring, activity monitoring, compliance monitoring, beneficiary monitoring etc.


Evaluation

- An assessment of the program/project's goals
- The purpose is to determine the fulfilment of objectives, effectiveness, impact and sustainability
- Involves defining and reflecting upon the effects of what has been done, and judging their worth
- Varies on timing, person who conducts the evaluation, and methodology
- Examples of evaluation types; midterm evaluations, final evaluations, external evaluations, real-time evaluations
